British tour firms call for major crackdown on Magalluf

- UK travel industry tell Balearic officials at the World Travel Market tourism fair in London that they want *Brits Behaving Badly* to be outlawed in the resort.
- Balearic Minister for tourism, Jaime Martinez, says that Magalluf's Calle Punta Ballena is no longer fit for purpose and says that new investment will change the face of the resort.

A strong Balearic tourism delegation went to the World Travel Market fair in London yesterday with an upbeat message about the islands but they soon found that everyone was talking about one thing; Magalluf. The British tour operators, who had a meeting with both Spanish and Balearic tourism officials, called for a major crackdown on Magalluf and called for the local authorities to stamp out bad behaviour in the resort. The move came yesterday after reports that some

Cameron's party shrugs German disquiet over EU immigration plans

London.—Prime Minister David Cameron's Conservative party yesterday shrugged off German anxiety about its plans to curb immigration from the European Union, saying it would tackle what has become a major public concern regardless.

"The British public want this addressed. We are going to do this in a calm, rational way," George Osborne, Britain's finance minister and a close Cameron ally, said after Ger-

man media reported Chancellor Angela Merkel was uneasy about the idea. Under growing pressure from the anti-EU UK Independence Party (UKIP) ahead of a May 2015 national election and from some of his own lawmakers, Cameron has said he'd like to try to curb EU immigration if re-elected. He hasn't explained how, and any changes would be contingent upon him winning the next election **Inside**.
