PALMA. *Moonbeam IV*, the 32-metre yacht on which Prince Rainier of Monaco and Grace Kelly spent time during their honeymoon, arrived at Palma's Club de Mar on Sunday.

It will be taking part in the Balearic Islands Classic regatta.

A cutter that is one of the few survivors from the romantic era of sports sailing, it was designed by William Fife and built at the Fife & Sons shipyard in Scotland.

The building started in 1914.

Because of the war it wasn't delivered until 1920.

One of the longest and most comfortable regatta yachts, it twice won Cowes Week and was then sold to Henry Sutton, who competed with it for some ten years.

In 1950 it was acquired by Prince Rainier, who named it *Deo Juvante* and who

sailed it until 1960. The current owners found the yacht in Greece in 1995 and restored it in Burma.

In 2002, it took part in events at the America's Cup. Since 2006 it has been based on the French Riviera.

With eight sails of some 800 square metres of fabric, it is considered to be one of the world's most beautiful yachts.
