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## Rory Stewart knocked out of the leadership race

Rory Stewart was 1st night knocked out of the Conservative Party leadership race, after coming last in the third round of voting among Tory MPs with 27 votes.

Boris Johnson came out on top again, increasing his number of votes to 143, up from the 126 he gained in the ballot on Tuesday. Jeremy Hunt remains in second place with 54 votes, Michael Gove is third with 51, and Sajid Javid

is fourth with 38. They will all go through to the next round today.

### Madrid car ban in spotlight

● Madrid's new municipal government plans to suspend some anti-car emissions policies in the city centre, drawing a warning from the European Commission that Spain might be sanctioned if it fails to meet air quality standards. The municipality, controlled by the conservative People's Party (PP), said on Monday that from July 1 it would suspend fines on cars entering a currently restricted area of around 5 sq km (2 sq miles), while it conducts a review of the policy.

The PP says the current restrictions have been too disruptive. The policy, known as 'Madrid central', started last November when the city's then far-left government banned most petrol and diesel cars from its centre as a way to tackle high levels of nitrogen dioxide in Madrid.
