BRITISH CORONAVIRUS PATIENT DISCHARGED FROM HOSPITAL AFTER SECOND NEGATIVE TEST

PALMA. The British father and Majorcan resident who was admitted to Son Espases Hospital after testing positive for the coronavirus following a ski trip in France last month, last night tested negative for the second time and was discharged from hospital, meaning he will be allowed to return home to his family.

The Briton, who came into contact with the so-called British super-spreader while in France, began showing clear signs of having recovered from the virus on Thursday but remained in isolation at Son Espases until further tests proved fully conclusive - which they did yesterday with medical staff at Son Espases equipped with special test packs which meant than results no longer had to be sent to Madrid.

The Balearic Ministry for Health has asked for the family to be given the privacy it deserves while they continue to track down and contact any other people the Briton may have come into contact with.

The German who also contracted the virus and was treated in the Canary Islands was also given the all clear yesterday. Anyone suspecting they may have the virus should contact 061. **SEE INSIDE**



STORM DENNIS WARNING TO BALEARIC AIR PASSENGERS



PALMA. Passengers booked to fly between the UK and the Balearics this weekend were yesterday advised to contact their airlines because of the fierce storm forecast to hit the UK which could lead to cancellations.

Storm Dennis will batter the whole of the UK with up to five inches of rain and 80mph winds, causing huge flood risks.

The Met Office has issued four danger to life weather

warnings as Storm Dennis hurtles towards Britain.

A number of airlines contacted clients yesterday to warn them of potential flight disruption and offer them the opportunity of changing their flights at no extra cost.

Last weekend, hundreds of flights and major events were cancelled as dangerous winds and snow took hold across the United Kingdom and now the country is braced for more.
