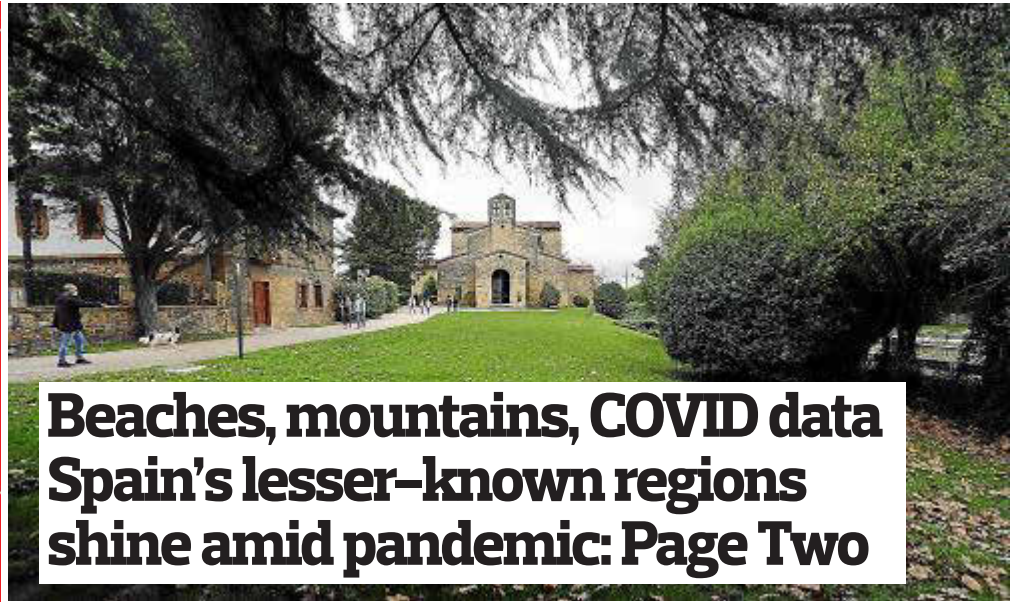

Spain to get first Pfizer vaccines in early 2021, Health Minister says



Spain would get the first vaccines against COVID-19 developed by U.S. pharmaceuticals Pfizer and its partner BioNTech in early 2021, Health Minister Salvador Illa said yesterday. The country would initially get 20 million vaccine doses, enough to immunize 10 million

people, Illa said in an interview with state broadcaster TVE. The vaccination would be free for everyone, Illa added. Enough people would be vaccinated by April-May, so that the fight against the pandemic in Spain would move to another stage, Illa added. The Spanish government will act to convince

the substantial portion of the population who is wary of the vaccine. "We will tell the truth, which is that vaccines save lives," Illa said.

News on Monday that a vaccine from Pfizer and BioNTech was more than 90% effective sparked a wave of optimism around the world.

Norwegian Air could grind to a halt early 2021

Norwegian Air's cash crisis could force the debt-laden budget airline to halt operations early next year, the company warned as it issued another plea for rescue funding after reporting quarterly results yesterday.

The rapid expansion of the pioneer in low-fare transatlantic flights has left it with heavy debts, with its problems compounded by the COVID-19 pandemic.

It is now serving domestic routes only, with six of its 140 aircraft flying.

"Norwegian is dependent on additional working capital in order to continue operating through the first quarter of 2021 and beyond," the carrier said.

The company held cash and cash equivalents of 3.4 billion crowns (\$376 million) at the end of September, down from 4.98 billion crowns three months earlier.

Norway's government on Monday rejected a plea for more state support for the airline, the shares of which have lost 99% of their value since January, saying it would be too risky.
