

# A corner of Palma that's 'finger-licking good'

Churreria Gabri's will serve its delicious churros with chocolate until the early hours of the morning on 25 and 26 December and 1 January.

**Raluca Purcelea** is the owner of this charming churros café located in Plaza Madrid in Palma. Her passion for churros and her ease in interacting with people gave her the idea to create **Churreria Gabri's**, named after her daughter **Gabriela Silvia Purcelea.** 

The hard work of this couple has meant that today, a year after opening, they have a loyal clientele who "have breakfast and lunch here every day", says the owner, who gratefully adds that "we didn't expect such a warm welcome so quickly; word of mouth works very well". Their goal is for Churreria Gabri's to be a go-to spot for the surrounding neighbourhoods and for tourists visiting the area.

When asked about the secret of her churros and porras, Raluca is clear: "love, enthusiasm and hard work". The establishment also offers delicious breakfasts, sandwiches for lunch or afternoon tea, as well as set meals and a dish of the day with a drink, all at reasonable prices. The cuisine is a blend of traditional dishes from her homeland, Romania, and Mallorca. Pa amb oli with sobrasada and goat's cheese with caramelised onions "is the star of our menu", she assures us.

An initiative that is very popular with customers: every Sunday, they hold a prize



draw in which customers can participate by submitting their receipts. The winners, who are announced on Facebook every week, receive a basket filled with various products.
